## COMMUNITY LoboAlerts

We have learned that some people have been sending inappropriate responses to LoboAlerts. Please note that this behavior is inappropriate for a student at the University of New Mexico. The purpose of the alerts are to notify students of potential safety concerns. Inappropriate responses potentially limit the timely effectiveness of the alerts. Further, University of New Mexico Staff actually read these responses. It is important that all members of the UNM community feel comfortable in order to do their jobs and engage in their studies, free of this type of harassment. We take these matters seriously. Should a student continue to send harassing text messages to the LoboAlerts, the student may be subject to disciplinary measures through the UNM Student Code of Conduct.



## Your Voice Counts! Institutional Assessment Days

The UNM Office of Assessment is announcing a new university-wide initiative starting this fall -- UNM Institutional Assessment Day (IAD). The purpose of IAD is to receive feedback and gather information from students about how well the University is doing in ensuring that our students' academic experiences are positive. IAD will provide an opportunity for students to share their views by taking online surveys from various administrative and student support service departments that help answer questions such as: What is UNM doing well? What can be changed at UNM to make it more efficient and effective? Also, preselected students will have the opportunity to receive individual scores about how well they are learning compared to their peers and other institutions by taking assessments that measure the development of their Core general education skills and workforce skills. IAD is scheduled to occur on October 14th and 15th at the UNM-Main and UNM-Valencia campuses, and October 20th and 21st (tentative) at the UNM-Gallup and UNM-Los Alamos campuses. Students who complete at least three surveys and/or assessments on an IAD will receive a UNM T-shirt and other free perks, and they will be entered in a drawing for additional prizes. All University faculty, staff, and student organizations are asked to encourage students to participate in IAD.

## COMMUNITY Copy Rights Memo

As you may be aware, organizations representing copyright owners such as the Recording Industry Association of America and the Motion Picture Association of America have long objected to the illegal downloading of material or the use of peer-to-peer (P2P) file sharing on university networks that individual users of the internet. UNM regularly receives notices from these organizations alleging that individual users of the University's network are engaged in illegal file sharing. Further investigation shows that some notices are the result of compromised computers whose owners are not keeping their operating systems up to date with patches, while others are the result of deliberate illegal file sharing.

While file sharing technology can be used in lawful and constructive ways, much P2P activity constitutes copyright infringement. Using UNM computer resources to engage in copyright infringement violates University Business Policy 2500 (Acceptable Computer Use). Under this policy, copyright violations could result in withdrawal of use privileges; disciplinary action, up to and including, expulsion from the University; or, discharge from a position of employment as well as other sanctions. In addition, copyright infringement places an individual at risk with respect to both civil and criminal charges.
