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# Public Transportation Programs Bureau of the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department

## What is the Public Transportation Programs Bureau?

The Public Transportation Programs Bureau (PTPB) is the office of the State Highway and Transportation Department that oversees publicly funded transit programs in New Mexico.

## What is its Mission?

The PTPB supports the development of transit as a viable transportation choice for all New Mexico and administers multiple grants from the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) that support general and specialized transportation programs in the state.

## What Types of Public Transportation Programs Exist in New Mexico?

There are four general types of transportation programs: fixed route for the general public; demand response for the general public; specialized transportation for the elderly and handicapped; and transportation for people moving from welfare to work.

## How are These Programs Funded?

Most programs are funded by a combination of federal, state, and local monies. Federal dollars are distributed by the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) under various sections of the Transportation Equity Act for the Twenty-First Century. These program sections are described later in this booklet.

## Why is Public Transit Important?

Public transit is important to the economic vitality of individual communities and to the state as a whole. Many people are **transit-dependent**—they cannot operate a private vehicle because of their age,

physical or mental ability, or financial status. They depend on public transit to access jobs, businesses, shopping, recreation, childcare, and medical and educational facilities.

Other people are **transit-by-choice**. Although they may be able to operate and afford a private vehicle, they chose to use public transit to help conserve the environment, to reduce personal stress, to minimize their impact on air quality, to reduce wear and tear on their vehicle, and/or to save money.

Public transit enriches communities by facilitating the affordable and reliable movement of people to and from work, vital services, businesses, and recreation.

### **How Can Someone Learn More About These Programs?**

This booklet describes the types of public transit services offered in the state and lists the providers in each New Mexico community. Persons needing transportation should call the provider listed in their area for detailed information on how to access transit services.

## **Types of Transit Services Provided**

**Fixed Route Bus/Van Service** - New Mexico's three largest cities and several smaller towns offer fixed route bus service. On a fixed route, buses/vans travel on a set route and at scheduled times throughout the day. Most fixed route bus/van stops are marked with "Bus Stop" signs that indicate the route name and number. Some systems allow passengers to "flag" down a bus/van along the route. Passengers can call the bus service to request a map and schedule of all routes and individual fare and monthly pass information.

**Demand Response Bus/Van Service** - Many smaller towns do not offer fixed route transit service. Instead they offer rides "on demand." This is termed demand response service. Passengers must call in advance to schedule a ride. Some systems require 24-hour notice for a trip while others may be able to provide immediate response service.

Demand response service may be provided under the name Public Transportation System, Dial-A-Ride, or Taxi Program. Some systems use demand response to meet the transportation needs of elderly and

disabled riders. Vehicles used in demand response service are usually small buses, vans, or sedans.

**Hybrid Deviated-Demand Response Service** - A few transit providers offer a service which is a cross between fixed route and demand response. On a deviated fixed route, a passenger calls ahead of time to schedule pick up at a location off the regular bus route but in the immediate service area. All passenger drop offs must occur at regular bus stops.

**Specialized Transportation for the Elderly and Disabled** - While fixed route and demand response service are open to all riders, some communities offer specialized transportation for elderly and disabled passengers who are enrolled in a human services program such as a senior center or a sheltered workshop. These transport services may be funded through a human services agency, an agency on aging, or a transportation department.

**Welfare-to-Work Transportation** - Some municipalities and counties offer transportation services for welfare recipients who are moving into the work force. These services are flexible and allow trip chaining. For example, a parent and her/his dependent children may board a van in front of their house and go to a day care center where the children are dropped off, then on to a job site where the parent is employed. At the end of the work day, the parent boards the van back to the day care center to pickup the children, and from there the family proceeds home.

Welfare-to-Work transportation is jointly funded by federal dollars from the Federal Transit Administration Job Access and Reverse Commute grants, the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services Temporary Assistance for Needy Families grants, and the U. S. Department of Labor Welfare-to-Work grants.

## **Additional Transportation Services**

**Accessible Transportation Services** - Under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990, all publicly funded transportation providers must offer transportation services that are accessible to individuals who are unable to ride regular bus service because of a disability. This service is referred to as paratransit or accessible transit for the mobility impaired.

Paratransit is more personalized than fixed route service and drivers pickup and drop off passengers curbside (from one specific address to another). Usually a trip must be scheduled 24 hours in advance and passengers must be certified as eligible for ADA services (through a telephone interview).

**Ridesharing** - Ridesharing is two or more people getting together to share a ride, either in a carpool or vanpool. It helps alleviate the stress and hassle of the everyday commute and reduces the personal cost of transportation.

Larger transit systems provide rideshare services. They offer a computerized matching service to help people find others with similar commuting needs who also want to rideshare. The two most common types of ridesharing are carpooling and vanpooling.

Carpooling is sharing a ride with two or more people. Individuals may alternate who drives and who rides. Vanpooling is sharing a ride with a larger group of people who usually travel longer distances. Local transit agencies assist people in locating riders to make a vanpool. Riders share the cost, and in some cases the driver rides for free in exchange for overseeing the vanpool.

Ridesharing also helps to relieve traffic congestion and improve air quality. Local rideshare agencies can help commuters on long or short trips taken everyday or once a month. Even if only two people share a ride, they each will reduce their commute costs by about fifty percent.

**Guaranteed Ride Home** - A guaranteed ride home program is a free service that some urban public transit agencies provide to people who travel to work or school at least three days per week on an alternate mode of transportation: carpool, vanpool, bicycle, or bus. The transit agency will guarantee the person a free ride home (usually in a taxi) in case of an emergency such as a family illness, personal illness, or unscheduled overtime. Riders must be registered with the transit agency to be eligible for this service.

## List of Providers

The PTPB administers various grants from the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) that support general and specialized transportation programs in the state. These programs are named for the section of the federal transportation law that created them.

## Rural Transit Providers

SECTION 5311 is a FTA program that funds capital, administrative, and operating costs for public transit systems in rural areas and towns with a population less than 50,000. These funds are apportioned to the states annually by a formula that is based on the number of persons living in nonurbanized areas in each state. The goals of the nonurbanized formula program are: to enhance the access of people in nonurbanized areas to health care, shopping, education, employment, public services and recreation; to assist in the maintenance, development, improvement, and use of public transportation systems in rural and small urban areas; to encourage and facilitate the most efficient use of all Federal funds used to provide passenger transportation in nonurbanized areas through the coordination of programs and services; to assist in the development and support of intercity bus transportation; and to provide for the participation of private transportation providers in nonurbanized transportation to the maximum extent feasible. Funds are provided on an 80/20-match ratio for capital and administrative expenses and 50/50 match for operating expenses. Eligible applicants include local governments and private non-profit providers.

## Urban Transit Providers

SECTION 5307 is a Federal Transit Administration (FTA) formula grant program which allocates funds to every urbanized and large urbanized area in the country based on a federal formula. An urbanized area is a city with a population of 50,000-200,000 persons; a large urbanized area is a city with more than 200,000 people. Funds are provided on an 80/20-match ratio. Transit systems in urbanized and large urbanized cities, including Albuquerque, Las Cruces, and Santa Fe, receive their funds directly from the FTA.

## Specialized Transportation for the Elderly and Disabled

SECTION 5310 is a FTA program that funds specialized transportation to meet the needs of the elderly and disabled people. Funds are apportioned to states based on the number of elderly persons and persons with disabilities according to the latest available U. S. Census data. The Public Transportation Programs Bureau distributes these funds to non-profit organizations through an annual application and awards process. The funds may be used for capital acquisition only, such as vehicles, radios, and wheelchair lifts. Funds are provided on an 80/20 federal/local match ratio.

## Welfare to Work

SECTION 3037 of the Transportation Equity Act for the Twenty-First Century is a FTA program that is awarded to states and urbanized and large urbanized areas on a nationally competitive basis. Job Access grants are intended to provide transit service to assist welfare recipients in getting to jobs and training. Reverse Commute grants are designed to develop transit services to transport urban or rural workers to suburban job sites. Job Access and Reverse Commute grants require a 50 percent local match. Federal funds other than those from the U. S. Department of Transportation may be used for the match.

## Other PTPB Grant Programs

The Public Transportation Programs Bureau also administers several transportation planning and technical assistance grants for the Federal Transit Administration. These include the following:

SECTION 5303 is a FTA formula grant program that deals with long range transportation planning, coordinating, designing, and engineering of multi-modal, inter-modal, and mass transit by metropolitan planning organizations. Also included in this grant program are regional problem solving, resource development and distribution, and integrated management of transportation systems and facilities in metropolitan, multi-state, and international border crossings.

SECTION 5309 is a FTA program that authorizes discretionary grants to public transit agencies to fund capital projects such as buses, bus facilities, and rail projects.

SECTION 5311(b) funds the Rural Technical Assistance Program (RTAP) to provide staff and driver training for rural transit programs.

SECTION 5313 is a formula grant to states that sets forth the guidelines for statewide planning of transportation on a general basis, outlines the planning process goals and functions, and calls for the fair and equitable treatment, within that planning process, for all areas of the state.

## A New Climate for Public Transportation Programs

With the passage of the Transportation Equity Act for the Twenty-First Century (TEA-21) in 1998, states saw dramatic increases in Federal support for public transportation projects in rural, urban, and large urban communities.

Along with this increased funding came a Federal mandate for transportation coordination. This mandate requires local governmental agencies and nonprofit organizations that receive *any* Federal funds to provide non-emergency transportation to participate and coordinate with Federal Transit Administration-funded agencies in the design and delivery of transportation services. The purpose of this mandate is to increase program efficiency by more fully utilizing existing capital resources and reducing duplication of services.
