Preparing to Apply

Deadlines vary, but the application process begins years before you submit your application

Possible requirements:

- College major
- Prerequisite courses
- GPA
- Test scores
- Other experience!



Preparing to Apply

You may have started the process already

- Exploring careers and programs
- Gaining subject mastery
- Getting experience through internships, jobs and volunteer work
- Building relationships with professors and mentors



Preparing to Apply

It's okay if you don't meet all the requirements yet

Take some time to prepare

- Prereq courses
- Grade replacements
- Internships and other experience
- Test prep

Consider taking a graduate course as a nondegree student

Same applies if not accepted on first try



Experience Counts

Hands-on experience is often the most important part of an application

Get as much experience as you possibly can

- Research
- Internships
- Volunteering
- Shadowing
- Jobs
- And more!

An important way to test drive the field/profession

• And form relationships with people who can write letters of recommendation

Know your priorities

Possible considerations:

- Program focus and resources
- Faculty and research opportunities
- Rankings and reputation
- Costs and funding
- Location and access
- Culture of community, university and program

What's Inside a Grad Application?

Application forms and fees

Exam scores

Transcripts

CV or resume

Application essay

Letters of recommendation

Interview



Forms and Fees

Application forms

- University
- Graduate program
- Financial aid
- Scholarships
- Fees (often \$50-\$100 per program)



Exam Scores

- GRE, MCAT, LSAT, etc.
- Testing dates & deadlines
- Preparation courses
- **Preparation materials**
- Practice tests
- How much does it matter to this program?



Transcripts

Official transcripts from every college or university you attended

Don't procrastinate!



CV or Resume

Tailor closely to program

- Research programs: CV
- Professional programs: resume or CV-resume hybrid

In general, longer is okay (2-3 pages)



What's the difference between a letter of intent and a personal statement?

Application Essays

Both are persuasive essays arguing that you are a great candidate for the program

A letter of intent, also called a statement of purpose, is a formal document describing relevant experience and goals

• Academic cover letter

A **personal statement** is a work of creative nonfiction in which you tell a story about who you are and why you belong in this program

• Professional memoir

But, the terms are sometimes used interchangeably, including by grad programs!

- Research programs are more likely to ask for a letter of intent
- Professional programs are more likely to ask for a personal statement



Application Essays

The prompt is your best friend

You can't write a great essay at the last minute

Plan to spend weeks to months on this

Get lots of feedback

- Career Services and Graduate Resource Center
- Professors and mentors



Who should you ask to write your letters of recommendation?

Letters of Recommendation

Ideal letter writers are people who:

- Think you are awesome
- Know you well
- Know the field/profession
- Will be seen as convincing and relevant by the admissions committee

Typically professors and professionals in field of interest or a closely related field

Ask well in advance of deadlines (at least 4-6 weeks)

Quality counts!

Most programs require 3 recommendations

Recommenders may ask to see your CV and essay



Interview

Often required

A lot like a job interview

Interview formats

- Regular one-on-one interview
- Panel interview
- Group interview
- Multiple mini interviews

Costs and Funding

Varies widely by program and field

Funding may be available through the department

- Assistantships in teaching and research
- Professional programs vs. research programs

Consider a national service program

AmeriCorps, Peace Corps, National Guard

Scholarships and grants

Employer tuition assistance

Loan forgiveness programs





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
