

# **Course Description**

Introduction to Psychology is designed to give students an overview of the core topics in contemporary psychology. Topics covered include the history of psychology, brain and behavior, sensation and perception, learning and memory, motivation, personality theories and psychological disorders. Students can expect to learn about key concepts, suggested theories and related empirical research, as well as current issues and controversies. This course offers students an opportunity to achieve a better understanding of how the human mind works and how to apply what's learned in the classroom into everyday life.

Students are encouraged to frequently ask questions and seek help from the instructor or available tutors. Time management is also extremely important. If you don't plan sufficient time outside of class for completing assignment on time and studying you will always find yourself behind and confused. Attendance will be taken for each class, however your attendance to class is your responsibility and the consequence for non-attendance is also your responsibility.

## **Course Objectives**

After successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- ▶ Describe the field of psychology (e.g., define "psychology," list the major sub fields, discuss what psychologists do and the kinds of information they consider to be important, describe the methods of study utilized by psychologists).
- ▶ Define or describe basic concepts and principles of psychology, and
- ▶ Apply the information provided in this course to real-life situations

## **Weekly Assignments (Homework)**

There will be 5 homework assignments. Assignments will review the material covered and require students to apply the concepts learned. Each assignment is worth 4 points. Credit is given based on the amount of effort shown in your work and not the correctness of the answers given. Students are urged to make a personal copy of each assignment in the event credit is not given for a completed assignment. No assignments will be accepted after the corresponding exam.

#### **Exams**

There will be three exams plus a comprehensive final exam. The first three exams are worth 15 points each. These exams will include material from the text and lecture and are closed book, closed notes. The final exam is worth 35 points and will consist of questions on all chapters from the textbook as well as class lectures. Make-up exams are only given if you notify the instructor within 24 hours of the missed exam and have a reasonable excuse.

# **Extra Credit (Review Exercises)**

Students will be given the opportunity earn extra credit. These optional assignments will further review the material covered in class and in the text. Although there is no specific number of extra credit assignments planned, students can expect to have the opportunity to earn no less than 5 points extra credit for the semester.

#### **Grades**

Your final course grade will be computed from your four exam scores and seven homework assignments. There are a total of 100 points possible for the course (5 homework assignments @ 20 points, three exams @ 45 points, and a comprehensive final exam @ 35 points for a total of 100 points possible for the class). The assignment of final letter grades will be contingent on the total class performance. However, students may expect the following grading distribution to be used in lieu of the total class performance: A  $\rightarrow$  90 - 100, B  $\rightarrow$  80-89, C  $\rightarrow$  70-79, D  $\rightarrow$  60-69, and F  $\rightarrow$  59 or less. A grade of C or above must be achieved In order to receive credit (CR) for this course.

#### **IMPORTANT**

In the event CNM is closed the day of the scheduled final exam, the final exam will be rescheduled to the first non-exam day available, at the same time and the same location as originally scheduled. If closures occur for more than one day during finals week, finals cancelled on subsequent days will be rescheduled for the next available day; again at the same time and location originally scheduled. If rescheduling of a final exam is impossible due to a lengthy closing during finals week, final grades for students will be calculated on the work assessed up to that point.
