Description of Research, Teaching and Service Interests:

I study the relationship between democracy, dictatorship, and the international system. A central focus of my work has been to examine the practice of U.S. military interventions to understand how liberal culture and republican institutions of government cause democracies to behave in distinctive ways in the world. My book, *Democracy at the Point of Bayonets*, and related articles use a liberal domestic politics argument to understand the promotion of democracy during U.S. military interventions. Another piece uses a constructivist interpretation of the Spanish-American War to illuminate the importance of an intersubjective consensus around a shared liberal identity and of the power of the United States in shaping the liberal pacific union. Another project, with Shannon Sanchez-Terry, uses the liberal approach to explain the puzzling pattern of Clinton administration military intervention in Bosnia. I have also applied the liberal approach to the Inter-American system in a review essay, a book chapter on human rights and U.S. policy toward Peru, with Kenneth Roberts and an article on the collective defense of democracy regime in the Americas, with Randall Parish. "Dictatorial Peace?" with Caroline Beer and Shannon Sanchez-Terry, looks at the conflict behavior of specific types of authoritarian regimes to discover whether democracies are the only type of regime to avoid conflict with similar polities. "Peaceful Parties and Puzzling Personalists," with Caroline Beer, extends this examination of authoritarian regimes to look at the relationships between single-party regimes and personalist dictatorships.

My research also examines how the international system shapes democracy within states. In "Forcing Them to be Free," I argue that the U.S. has proven relatively successful at building democracy in the states in which it has intervened when it has actively promoted free and fair elections during those interventions. In "Liberal Social Reconstruction and the Resolution of Civil Wars in Central America," William Stanley and I examine three cases in which the United Nations was able to help resolve civil wars through the promotion of liberal democratic reforms.

My commitment to excellence in teaching earned me the Gunter Starkey teaching award for the College of Arts and Sciences in 2003 and the University of New Mexico Outstanding Teacher of the Year Award for 1996-1997. At the graduate level, I have taught the Pro-Seminar in International Relations numerous times, have taught a course on American Foreign Policy, and have offered research seminars on U.S. National Security Policy and Democracy and the International System. At the undergraduate level, I have introduced a serious 8-10 page paper assignment in the introductory International Politics course to make this course more challenging. I have also incorporated a variety of innovative teaching practices in my 300 and 400 level courses, including special research assignments, decision-making exercises, and a multi-university, web-based Model Organization of American States. I have served on numerous Ph.D., M.A. and undergraduate honors thesis committees and am UNM's representative for the Rhodes Scholarship Program.

I have participated in a range of service activities. Since arriving at UNM, I have worked on building ties of cooperation between the Department of Political Science and Sandia National Laboratories by organizing a speaker series and an internship program with Sandia. I have served on committees at the Latin American and Iberian Institute, University Honors program, the Faculty Senate Library Committee, the International Studies Institute, the Academic Freedom and Tenure Committee, and in the department.
