

SPANISH UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

FIRST MAJOR: 30 HOURS IN SPANISH COURSES NUMBERED 300 AND ABOVE.
12 HOURS (OR EQUIVALENT SKILL LEVEL) IN ANOTHER FOREIGN LANGUAGE.

REQUIRED COURSES (21 HOURS):

301 Topics (only 3 credit hours/1 class will apply toward a Spanish major)
302 Developing Spanish Writing Skills
307 Introduction to Hispanic Literature
350 Spanish Phonology, OR 351 Introduction to Spanish Linguistics
352 Advanced Grammar
411 OR 412 Survey of Spanish Literature I, II
431 OR 432 Survey of Latin American Literature I, II

PLUS 9 ELECTIVE HOURS OF SPANISH COURSES: 3 must be at the 400 level.

A student may follow a general course of studies or emphasize one of these areas:

✦ PENINSULAR LITERATURE ✦ LATIN AMERICAN LITERATURE ✦ SOUTHWEST HISPANIC STUDIES ✦ HISPANIC LINGUISTICS

For students who will continue their studies in Spanish at the graduate level we recommend that they take all four survey courses, 411, 412, 431, 432.

PLUS 12 HOURS IN ANOTHER FOREIGN LANGUAGE AT THE 202, 212 OR 276 LEVEL OR EQUIVALENT SKILL LEVEL:

Due to the similarities between the two languages, the Department encourages students to take Portuguese. Students can achieve a high level of proficiency in Portuguese after completing the intensive two course sequence of Port 275-276.

SECOND MAJOR: 24 HOURS IN SPANISH COURSES NUMBERED 300 AND ABOVE.

REQUIRED COURSES (9 HOURS):

301 Topics (A minimum of 3 hours are **required**, but up to 6 credits hours/2 classes of 301 courses will apply toward a second major.)
302 Developing Spanish Writing Skills
307 Introduction to Hispanic Literature

PLUS 15 ELECTIVE HOURS: 3 of these hours may be fulfilled with another 301 course; 6 hours must be above 307; and another 6 hours must be at the 400 level. Students planning to study Spanish at the graduate level should choose elective hours from the first major requirements.

✦ STUDENTS WITH MORE ADVANCED OR NATIVE LANGUAGE SKILLS ARE ENCOURAGED TO TAKE COURSES ABOVE 301, A HIGHER LEVEL COURSE MAY BE SUBSTITUTED FOR THE 301 REQUIREMENT – SEE REVERSE SIDE OF THE PAGE. ✦

MINOR: 18 HOURS OF SPANISH COURSES NUMBERED 300 AND ABOVE.

REQUIRED COURSES (9 HOURS):

301 Topics (A minimum of 3 hours are **required**, but up to 9 credits hours/3 classes of 301 courses will apply toward a minor.)
302 Developing Spanish Writing Skills
307 Introduction to Hispanic Literature

PLUS 9 ELECTIVE HOURS: 3 hours must be above 307; 6 of these elective hours may be fulfilled with 301 courses.
