WRC Survey to Assess the Climate for Women at UNM Update...

As work nears completion on the *Survey to Assess the Climate for Women at UNM*, the following preliminary recommendations are based on the 1052 responses received:

- *Establish a permanent Commission on the Status of Women at UNM which reports directly to the President or Board of Regents.*
- *Conduct a full "Status of Women at UNM" study using an independent agency to be repeated every 3-5 years to track progress and inform policy.*
- *Re-establish and permanently fund both the campus Crime Victim Advocate and Staff Advocate positions.*
- *Institution-wide review of all orientation programs and materials to ensure that appropriate information on policies and services, relating to equity and safety, is conveyed to new students, staff, and faculty.*
- *Increase educational programming and encourage supervisors/ departments to provide regular review sessions covering policies and services relating to equity and safety, with students, staff, and faculty.*
- *Increase frequency of communication containing policy information relating to equity and safety from the President's Office.*
- *Review and enhance campus safety and safety services.*

Several issues have been identified and are the focus of our advocacy work, in general terms they include: safety, equity, education, and outreach. So far, staff of the WRC have presented survey findings to several groups on campus, including the Regent's Academic, Student Affairs & Research Committee. Supreme Court Moves Backwards on Equal Pay

In May 2007, the Supreme Court decision in the case of *Ledbetter v. Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co.* ruled that a Title VII complaint must be filed within 180 days of the specific action that sets discriminatory pay, regardless of its ongoing and continuing discriminatory impact on the employee. As a result, many victims of pay discrimination will be left without an effective remedy, even though their rights have been violated. In response, the Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2007 has been introduced to the House of Representatives. www.now.org

Heartaches for Military Moms

Women represent 1 in 7 military personnel in Iraq, and 38 percent of active-duty women are mothers. Nearly half of active-duty women are in the lower pay grades—earning between \$14,436 and \$24,744. At least 230,000 children have a parent stationed in Iraq, Afghanistan or the Horn of Africa. www.womensenews.org

EEOC Clarifies Prohibition on Maternal Profiling

Family responsibility discrimination, also called “maternal profiling,” is pervasive in the workplace, where assumptions about mothers and caregivers frequently affect their salary, raises, and job opportunities. The National Organization for Women President, Kim Gandy, raised this issue in a late-January meeting with new EEOC Commissioner, Christine Griffin. The EEOC released new enforcement guidelines advising employers that this kind of discrimination is against the law. Want To Help Pass ENDA in 2007?

The Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA) was introduced in the 110th Congress in April 2007. ENDA, a proposed U.S. federal law, would prohibit discrimination against employees on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity. The bill is predicted to make it to the floor for a vote around September 2007. www.prideatwork.org

Violence Against Women in the United States

Every day four women die in this country as a result of domestic violence, the euphemism for murders and assaults by primarily husbands and boyfriends. That’s approximately 1,400 women a year, according to the FBI. www.now.org

Pass the ERA NOW.....It’s Time!

Representative Carolyn Maloney announced in March 2007 that she intended to reintroduce and fight for the passage of an amendment to the constitution that would ensure equal rights for women and men. The Women’s Equality Amendment was first introduced in 1923 and has been reintroduced 76 times. If passed and ratified, the following sentence would be added to the US Constitution: “Equality of Rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any state on account of sex.” To learn more and get involved log on to: www.feminist.org or equalrightsamendment.org

Breast Cancer Patient Protection Act

In September 2005 , as part of the Stop Breast Cancer for Life campaign, more than 12 million petition signatures were delivered to Capitol Hill, urging Congress to pass the bipartisan Breast Cancer Patient Protection Act of 2005 (S 910/HR1849). The bill would allow a woman and her doctor, not health insurance companies, to decide whether she should recuperate for at least 48 hours in the hospital after a mastectomy or whether she has enough support to get quality care at home. Not passed in September 2005, the bill was reintroduced in 2007 with the support of 14 million signatures from online petitions. 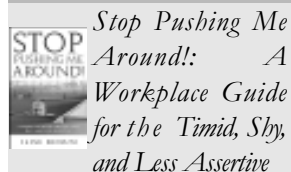

When Lissa was breastfeeding her baby, she experienced many challenges other mothers continue to face: locked lactation rooms, no privacy and having to pump in the bathroom. These experiences activated Lissa's passion to secure protections for breastfeeding mothers at work and school. Lissa is now a member of the NM Breastfeeding Task Force and worked with the UNM Graduate Professional Student Association and the WRC to craft legislation and create additional lactation stations at UNM. She also helped organize other moms and doctors to testify during the legislative session. Her hard work resulted in the successful passage of House Bill 613, which safeguards a nursing mother's right to use a breast pump in the workplace and to have a flexible break time in which to use it.
