Yury V. BOSIN | Teaching Success

Insurgencies

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The purpose of this memo is to provide a synopsis of my success in the classroom. I have extensive international and U.S. teaching experience. In 2001-2004, I taught various undergraduate and master level courses at Lomonosov State University of Moscow (MGU) focusing on politics and societies of Central and South Asia, and the Middle East. My courses covered a broad range of topics including internal and cross-border nationality problems, multilateral organizations, energy politics, and economic integration in the region. My average class size was about ten students. Since 2009, I have taught continuously for the Department of Political Science at the University of New Mexico. Over the course of the last five years, I have taught almost 500 undergraduates in eight classes. I have taught six classes of *Introduction to International Relations* (POLS 240) and two classes in *Insurgency* (POLS 340).

My evidence of teaching success is based on course evaluations that are administered to students at the end of the school semester by IDEA center.¹ My average score has been constantly in the top 30 % in both categories – Excellent Teacher and Excellent Course. The table and two figures below present a summary of my teaching effectiveness from 2009 through 2013. Table 1 reflects my scores of individual student responses on a 5-point scale with 1 indicating the lowest score and 5 indicating the highest. My highest scores in the category Excellent Teacher have been 4.9 in both POLS 240 and POLS 340. My highest scores in the category Excellent Course have been 4.6 in POLS 240 and 4.7 in POLS 340.



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Figure 1 compares my scores with the average scores in the discipline of *Political Science and Government* across all institutions in the IDEA database. All scores are standardized so that 50 points represent an average score and 10 points represent one standard deviation. Scores included in this figure reflect the Summary Evaluation of my teaching effectiveness.² The figure shows that my performance in classroom has been consistently well above the average in 2009-2013, and my highest score reached 61, which is more than one standard deviation above the average.


My scores compared with the average scores in the discipline of Political Science and Government across all institutions in the IDEA database in 2009-2013.



² According to IDEA's methodology, "Teaching effectiveness is assessed in two ways: **A. Progress on Relevant Objectives**, a weighted average rating of the progress they reported on objective selected as "Important" and "Essential" (double weighted) and **B. Overall Rating**, the average student agreement with statements that the teacher and the course were excellent. The **Summary Evaluation** is the average of these two measures."

Figure 2 is similar to Figure 1 but compares my scores with the average scores in all courses taught at the University of New Mexico in 2009-2013. My score has always been above the UNM average with the best score as high as 57.
