

Continued from Page 2: Busy Month for the 63 Spyder On February 5th I took the Spyder to get new tires installed. Tires I've been waiting many months for to arrive back in stock. Well, on the way home the car died on Comanche west of Carlisle. I managed to limp all the way to Montgomery and Pitt and finally gave up in front of the Animal Hospital. A quick call to Steve Gongora suggested it was the fuel pump. It was. Fortunately, I had plenty of cash on me and I coughed up \$120 to get



it towed home. The driver was very skillful as you can see from the photo as he put the Spyder right in the drive-

Dave Huntoon came by later that week, and we installed a mechanical fuel pump courtesy of Pat Hall. It leaked a

little (it's supposed to, right?). But we tightened all the screws and now it runs great. Dave also showed me how to balance the carburetors and we managed to get the idle speed down to 600-700 rpm. The only difficulty we had was I had removed the front seats and taken them to House of Covers for new foam. Accessing the gas pedal required some yoga skills and it was a pain in the butt trying to get out the car, but we managed. In the end it was a great learning experience and I'll be placing another Clark's order soon for two electric fuel pumps. I did see that Clark's has an ad in the Corsa Communique that says new mechanical fuel pumps are due 'soon'.

On Wednesday the 21<sup>st</sup> I traveled up to Las Vegas, NM to pick up the tote bags from out T-shirt vendor: Northgate Design and Print. They came out very well, but I was not smart enough to take picture of them. I will ask Brenda to bring one to the March meeting. - Cheers—Greg Nelson


### A Corvair Journey Through Time



I'm certain many of you know Pat Hall. Anyone who has been at any of our club's functions is sure to have had talked to Pat, the Corvair Ambassador. You also know that he is a person who loves his Corvairs. I know for a fact that he at one time owned upwards of 70 of them! I'm telling

you this because I'm sure that you would like to hear a story about Pat's all-time favorite Corvair, a car that he still owns. If you attended the last State Fair Car Show you might remember a spectacular blue 1965 Monza 4-door. That's the car! Pat treated this ride to an extensive restoration that has resulted in the car we

see today. So, I invite you to read on and learn the story of this special car and the lives it has touched.



What you might not know is that this car has an extensive history here in town. Though I can't trace it back to the showroom, I can relate some facts about what I like to call the "Blue Wonder". This car's story should impress anyone who owns a Corvair in Albuquerque and I'm excited to let Pat and everyone in CNM know about its path through our Corvair community.

We'll start our journey as far back as can be documented. Dave Langlois, who serves as the historian for many Corvairs in town told me that the 65 was once owned by none other than Francis "St Francis of Corvairs" Boydston. We old timers knew Francis well since he was the main person we talked to

if we needed any advice on Corvairs. Personally, I had some of my best times in Francis' garage talking about all sorts of Corvair things. One story I have was the time that I snapped a clutch cable at a gas station uphill from Francis' place. I solved my problem by coasting the car down the hill and Dave & Mona Langlois into his driveway! In no time I had my car back with the cable re-

> placed. He proved again that he was certainly the Saint of Corvairs. Anyway, Dave says that Francis sold the car to a couple named Mosel from Wisconsin and they took it back there for a time. However, this did not end the car's Albuquerque saga because they returned only to trash the engine and

sell the car to Dave.

Dave went on to tell me that he used the car regularly and when he became a father to twin boys, Sean and Dillion, were brought home in that very car. He continued to use the car, but Dave doesn't tend to keep most of his rides. That's probably the reason I've wound up with so many cars from him. Just ask Anne Mae!

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Here is where I enter the story. My kids, Javi and Sara were toddlers in 2001 when I decided that the 2-door, 66 Corsa I had wasn't working with the family. I figured a late 4-door would do the trick. That's when I spotted the 4-door at Dave's and knew that I had to have it. Dave was loath to sell since it was a factory 140 automatic with air. But he had his price, I paid it, and the car was mine. Whereupon I christened it "The Familymobile". It served its name very well ferrying around my two toddlers, who were secured by car seats in the back of the Monza.

couple of years I drove the family around in the 65. The car ran great and the 140 made driving a hoot. The car was (and still is) a hardtop and I loved cranking all the windows down. It made me feel like I had a modern version of a car that could be seen in the TV show, The Untouchables. Having so much ventilation was great since I decided to leave the air conditioning alone and dormant.

I don't recall the exact color of the car when I got it, but I'm sure it looked really worn. I changed all that with a sparkling white paint job with dark blue darts running along the bottom of the sides and in the back cove. I accented the look by painting the air cleaner the same dark blue. Part of that blue air cleaner remains on my 66 Monza. All in all, it was a pretty good-looking car for how little I

I should point out the Golds like to name their cars. We've had Eyore, Mrs. Moulder, Dodger... well you get the idea. Therefore, as I said before, our new 4door got the name Familymobile. Not

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Las Vegas, often known simply as Vegas, is a city in and the county seat of San Miguel County, New Mexico, United States. Once two separate municipalities (one a city and the other a town), both were named Las Vegas—West Las Vegas ("Old Town") and East Las Vegas ("New Town"); they are separated by the Gallinas River and retain distinct characters and separate, rival school districts.

The population was 13,166 at the <u>2020 census</u>. Las Vegas is located 110 miles (180 km) south of <u>Raton</u>, 65 miles (105 km) east of <u>Santa Fe</u>, 122 miles (196 km) northeast of <u>Albuquerque</u>, 257 miles (414 km) south of <u>Colorado Springs</u>, <u>Colorado</u>, and 326 miles (525 km) south of <u>Denver</u>.

History Las Vegas was established in 1835 after a group of settlers received a land grant from the Mexican government. (The land had previously been granted to Luis Mara Cabeza de Baca, whose family later received a settlement.) The town was laid out in the traditional Spanish Colonial style, with a central plaza surrounded by buildings which could serve as fortifications in case of attack. Las Vegas soon prospered as a stop on the Santa Fe Trail. During the Mexican—American War in 1846, Stephen W. Kearny delivered an address at the Plaza of Las Vegas claiming New Mexico for the United States. In 1847, the town was the site of the Battle of Las Vegas, which was a part of the broader Taos Revolt by local Hispanos and Pueblo peoples against United States forces. In 1860, the United States Congress passed a law allowing the Cabeza de Baca heirs to choose other grants in lieu of their Las Vegas grant.

In 1877 Las Vegas College, the precursor to <u>Regis University</u>, was founded in Las Vegas by a group of exiled Italian Jesuits. In 1887, Las Vegas College moved to <u>Denver</u> whereupon the name was changed.

The Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad arrived at Las Vegas from the north on July 4, 1879. To maintain control of development rights, it established a station and related development one mile (1.6 km) east of the Plaza, creating a separate, rival New Town, as occurred elsewhere in the Old West. The same competing development occurred in Albuquerque, for instance. During the railroad era Las Vegas boomed, quickly becoming one of the largest cities in the American Southwest. Turn-of-the-century Las Vegas featured all the modern amenities, including an electric street railway, the "Duncan Opera House" at the northeast corner of 6th Street and Douglas Avenue, a Carnegie library, the Castañeda Hotel (a major Harvey House), and the New Mexico Normal School (now New Mexico Highlands University). Since the decline and restructuring of the railroad industry began in the 1950s, the city's population has remained relatively constant. Although the two towns have been combined, separate school districts have been maintained (Las Vegas City Schools and West Las Vegas School District). The anti-colonist organization Las Gorras Blancas was active in the area in the 1890s.

Cowboy Reunions Beginning in 1915, the Las Vegas Cowboys' Reunions were held annually until 1931; then in 1939, the Cowboys' Reunions were re-established. Their slogan was, "Git Fer Vegas, Cowboy!" These reunions were organized by a group of ranching families and cowboys which soon became the Las Vegas Cowboys' Reunion Association. The Reunions celebrated ranching life, which began in northern New Mexico in the early 1800s and continues into the 21st century. The annual affair included pie eating contests, barbecues, parades, banquets, balls, and "ranch rodeos." In the early years, celebrities—cowhands as well as big-name bands, movie stars like Tom Mix, and artists such as Randall Davey—came to Las Vegas for this event. In later years, famous cowhands participated in the Cowboys' Reunion Rodeos. The Cowboys' Reunions reflected the occupations of the area and attracted huge crowds for their four days of events. In 1952, the Cowboys' Reunion Association invited the Rough Riders Association to join them at the annual rodeo.

**Outlaws** The arrival of the railroad in 1879 brought with it businesses, development and new residents, both respectable and dubious. Murderers, robbers, thieves, gamblers, gunmen, swindlers, <u>vagrants</u>, and <u>tramps</u> poured in, transforming the eastern side of the settlement into a virtually lawless brawl. Among the notorious characters were such legends of the Old West as: dentist <u>Doc Holliday</u> and his girlfriend <u>Big Nose Kate</u>, <u>Dave Rudabaugh</u>, <u>Jesse James</u>, <u>Billy the Kid</u>, <u>Wyatt Earp</u>, <u>Mysterious Dave Mather</u>, <u>Hoodoo Brown</u>, and Handsome Harry the Dancehall Rustler.

Historian Ralph Emerson Twitchell once claimed regarding the Old West, "Without exception there was no town which harbored a more disreputable gang of desperadoes and outlaws than did Las Vegas."



So the kids, as they often do, outgrew the confines of the Familymobile, and I decided to sell it so my wife would allow me another 'Vair. The problem is that 4-door late models are not in very high demand. I knew the drivetrain was solid, but I wouldn't be getting much because of the body style. Rather than sell it I gave it to my son Art.

For those of you keeping score, we are up to five owners-St. Francis, Wisconsin Folks, The Corvair expert, Dave Langlois, Yours Truly, and Art Gold.

Who Are We? This article explains the purpose of the Corvair Preservation Foundation (CPF), its National Corvair Museum (NCM), and how the Corvair Society of America (CORSA) Club Chapters can help financially a worthy organization. Although CPF is an affiliate of CORSA, each group is fully independent of the other in terms of all financial obligations, memberships, and general operations. Specifically, the CPF is 100% funded purely from its own tax-deductible memberships and donations. Moreover, membership in CORSA does not provide membership in the CPF – and vice versa. While enthusiasts are welcome and encouraged to join both, it is also worth noting that CORSA membership is not required for CPF membership.

**Our Mission!** The mission of the CPF foundation is to preserve and promote the history of the Corvair through documentation, public education, and acquiring significant artifacts.

What Do We Do? The CPF operates and maintains the National Corvair Museum located at 10041 Palm Rd. (Old Route 66), in Glenarm, Illinois. The museum displays significant historical vehicles with various examples of cars and trucks, along with engines, literature, design sketches, prototypes and experimental and artifacts. CPF also welcomes the opportunity to display cars and historical items on loan by fellow Corvair enthusiasts. The National Corvair Museum has been recognized and endorsed by General Motors as the official museum of North America to tell the national story of this air-cooled wonder.

Another function of CPF is sponsoring and awarding scholarships to deserving qualified high school students associated with active CORSA members. This scholarship program is named in honor of Frank Winchell, who was the former Engineering Staff Vice President of General Motors and Director of Engineering for Chevrolet Research and Development Group. Considered a true Corvair hero. He played a leading role in the successful defense of the Corvair during the trials against Chevrolet and GM. He is also credited with the development of the Corvair transaxle and was involved in the creation of several Corvair concept/project cars.

How can local Corvair clubs help CPF? While CPF and NCM is operated by volunteers, it still takes donations to keep the both running. We encourage clubs to create ideas to promote ways of giving to the CPF. For example, a club might have donation canisters with CPF literature available at local events. We know of at least one club who plans to restore a Corvair up and raffle it off with the donation of the funds raised given to CPF. Some clubs donate funds each year to the Frank Winchell Scholarship Fund, while others donate monthly to help cover the operating costs for the National Corvair Museum. No matter how small or large, every dollar counts and is most appreciated.

How can I become a CPF Member? Another way to support our organization is to become a member. When you join CPF, your annual dues not only support the ongoing operations of the **National Corvair Museum**, but also ALL our various initiatives. This includes Corvair recovery and restoration, CPF touring exhibits, funding for the Frank Winchell Scholarship program, and much more. Membership dues are only \$45/year. CPF Members enjoy an

official Membership Card, complimentary window cling, and free year-round admission to the CPF's **National Corvair Museum.** Your dues and donations are tax-deductible, and you'll also have the satisfaction of knowing your contributions help keep the history and preservation of the Chevy Corvair alive for future generations.

We Need Space! We recently kicked off a national capital campaign to raise funds for a permanent museum home. We have outgrown the space we currently lease and are looking into either building a new facility or purchasing an existing building, thus providing the Corvair with a permanent home to tell its story.

Are There Donation Alternatives? Donations to the CPF are not limited to revenue only. CPF welcomes donated items such as cars, parts, literature, and memorabilia, all of which are tax deductible.
